General Notes

The "How Long Blues" was originally recorded (and written?) by Ida Cox with Papa Charlie Jackson in 1925. It soon became a popular blues standard with many artists recording their own versions of the piece, including, notably, <u>Jimmy Yancey</u>.

What follows is a solo piano arrangement of Leroy Carr's version of the piece from 1928-1929. Several recordings of the piece appear on <u>Leroy Carr Vol. 1 (1928-1929)</u> on Document Records. You can hear a <u>representative recording on YouTube</u>.

Carr mostly plays the same eight bars over and over, roughly as follows:



Out of this raw material, modern player Ethan Leinwand has brilliantly crafted <u>an entire stand-alone piece</u>, slowing down Carr's tempo and giving the piece a more minor feel. The arrangement found below borrows heavily from Leinwand. The piece is as much Leinwand's as Carr's at this point.

I have left out articulation and pedaling in this score. Listen to the recording and copy, or use whatever sounds good to you.

As always, this sheet music is meant only as a guide to your own exploration of the piece. Make changes freely, and do whatever sounds good to you.
